THE SUNDAY SCHOOL OUTING.

We have decided this year to go to Weston-super-Mare, on Monday, July 22. It will be a great thing for some of us to see a little of our own county. Below you will find a little account which Mr. Pilkington has kindly written.

The children who have attended Sunday School regularly will go free of charge and will be provided with tea. All other children attending Charlton Day School will go free, but if they join the tea party must pay 1s.

We shall welcome any who wish to join the outing. The cost will be 5s. for the journey and 1s. for tea if required.

The Outing Club will be paying out on Tuesday, July 16, when it will be necessary for all who desire to join to give in their names.

As Weston-super-Mare is chosen for the Sunday School Outing this year, the Vicar has kindly allotted the space in the Magazine for a few notes (which I hope will be of service) on the wonderfully Historical and Geographical places near, or through which we shall pass. I am delighted we are breaking fresh ground, and feel sure the senior children will benefit greatly by actually seeing the places we so often read and talk about in the Day School.

Before reaching Sparkford note Cadbury Rings on the right, a very old British Stronghold. (These Rings may be seen from Sigwells.)

Wells, with its beautiful Cathedral, will be the next stop—a stop long enough, I hope, to enable every one to delight in the stately and handsome pile, and certainly to see the famous clock. Passing on towards Cheddar, with its amazing Gorge, we shall be skirting the slopes of the Mendip Hills (on our right), and sharp eyes will spot the famous Glastonbury Tor on the left. Next comes the Gorge itself. This, to be fully appreciated, should be descended, but I am afraid we shall have to be satisfied with an ascent of it—but do not fail to look back. Should time permit, a visit to the limestone caves, containing remarkable Stalactites and Stalagmites, would never be forgotten. But then we are in a hurry, for there are sands, sea breezes and ice-creams at Weston, so over the corner of the Mendips we speed, via Banwell, to our destination. From Weston note the hills of Wales and Cardiff across the Channel. After spending what I sincerely hope will be a happy and healthy day we shall return via Highbridge and over the Poldens. When on the Poldens cast your eyes to the right, and far below you will stretch the very low and flat tract on which the Battle of Sedgemoor was fought in 1685. Monmouth was defeated here by the forces of James II.

The next important town will be Street—then Somerton and so on home—and may we have an ideal day.

NURSING ASSOCIATION.

Nurse Cobb is retiring on July 1—after nine years' work in this district. From that date the Nursing Association is being reorganized and Charlton Horethorne is to be joined to North Cadbury.

Nurse Luke, the District Nurse, is being provided with a car, so will be able to get round the district easily. She will call in Charlton about three times a week and at other times if specially called for. A box has been fixed outside the Parish Room in which messages may be placed for Nurse Luke; urgent messages may be telephoned to North Cadbury Post Office and they will be sent to Nurse who lives next door.

Charlton Horethorne is asked to find a sum of £23 towards Nurse Luke's salary, so more subscribers are urgently needed. The subscription is 5s. a year, but members of the Horethorne League only pay 3s., as the League pays the difference. It is hoped to hold a Meeting of all subscribers and those interested in the Association, shortly.
